



As Chairman of FAU, my current objective is to utilize the formal training and experience I have acquired in the fields of electronics, computing, communications, business, sales, research, and diplomacy to create a sustainable multi-generational Pan-African infrastructure based on the skills of the African Diaspora in the USA and the estimated \$300T in assets in Africa. It is an Infrastructure supported by our creation of a new cyber currency called the African Dollar which we will build on forks of BlockChain Technology, USPTO 5,577,042, and other intellectual property.



I started Friends of the African Union (FAU) based on a meeting, on December 16th 2011, called by the then-Ambassador from the African Union to the USA, with members of the African Diaspora in the USA. I started FAU as an economic, social, humanitarian, charitable, educational and new media civil-society organization to improve the lives of the people of the African diaspora. The FAU's affirmative purpose is to support the work of the African Diaspora, from an African-American standpoint, in the African Union, the 55-nation African equivalent of the European Union.

In the years immediately following its formation, I led FAU participation in meetings with the United States government (2012-2016), African Nations (2012-2018), and African Union consultations (2013-2015), along with United Nations forums and conferences (2014-2018). I recruited allies including Native American tribal groups (2015). I also built a FAU affiliate structure with national

country bureaus, state assemblies, and local chapters (2016-2018).

As Chairman of Friends of the African Union I have helped bring resources together including skilled personnel, intellectual property and a signed a 2016 \$30B 5-year (2016-2020) bank based Community Benefit Agreement (CBA) with Fifth Third Bank, that last year (2018) added \$2B to its goals. The Bank has reported over \$7B in CBA activity from 2016 through 2019. Now is the time for FAU to use that CBA.

FAU is organized around the action in 2005, when the African Union defined the African Diaspora as "... peoples of African descent and heritage living outside the continent, irrespective of their citizenship, and who remain committed to contribute to the development of the continent and the building of the African Union."

BUREAUS & CHAPTERS INFORMATIONAL SUMMARY

FAU Bureaus are national organizations organized by 2 or more citizens of that country. They are incorporated per the laws of that country. Each country shall have an assembly of state chapters and that assembly may have representative groups for Capital Cities that are not states, Women, Men, Youth, Elders, People with Disabilities, Veterans, Military, Foreign Government Service Employees and the people who are not in the country and are of the African Diaspora.

FAU State Chapters are organized around the national governmentally recognized states and Capital Cities that are not states. Each Shall have its Annual Assembly in which all Chapters in the state shall be entitled to send a naturally born Male and Female member to vote on resolutions of action.

FAU County Chapters are political and geographic subdivision of a state in the USA

FAU Regional Chapters are political and geographic subdivision in other than the USA and may be metropolitan statistical area (MSA) in the USA. MSA's is a geographical region with a relatively high population density at its core and close economic ties throughout the area.

FAU Metropolitan Chapters are organized around a city inclusive of its surrounding areas that has more than a million people

FAU City Chapters are organized around a city exclusive of its surrounding areas that has more than a 300,000 people

FAU Neighborhood Chapters are within a FAU Metropolitan or City Chapters that has over 1,000 or more members of FAU who live in proximity to each other.

FAU New American Rites of Passage shall be created for each city, metropolitan, county or state FAU chapter and made up of members of the people of the African Union and their allies.

FAU College and University Chapters shall be for each institution and made up of members of the people of the African Union and their allies.

FAU School Chapters shall be for each institution and made up of members of the people of the African Union and their allies.

FAU Affiliated Organization Chapters shall be for each organization which has formally aligned with FAU and made up of members of the people of the African Union and their allies.

FAU Prison and or Jail Chapters shall be for each institution and made up of members of the people of the African Union.

In 2012 FAU adopted the following Ten Operational Principles (as amended in 2016):

- 1. We support the constitution of the United States of America (USA) and the African Union (AU), its constitutive act and the history and acts of the AU's predecessor organization the Organization of African Unity (OAU).
- 2. We support the recognition of the African Diaspora globally and legally by the AU based on actions in 2005 of the African Union Assembly when it defined the African Diaspora as "... peoples of African descent and heritage living outside the continent, irrespective of their citizenship, and who remain committed to contribute to the development of the continent and the building of the African Union".
- 3. We support application worldwide of the United Nations (UN) Universal Declaration of Human Rights.
- 4. We support the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (2015), the AU's Africa 2063 Plan for Africa (2013), the economic-social uplift of Africans on the continent and in the African Diaspora as well the work of the AU in regards to increasing trade between African Nations, and will incorporate the work of the International Year for People of African Descent (2011) as designated by the UN and Organization of American States and the UN's International Decade for People of African Descent (2015).
- 5. We support the strategy and agenda of the AU Economic, Social and Cultural Council (ECOSOCC) and through organization of African American Civil Society we support the AU Assembly five legacy projects (2012) and continuing efforts to strengthen the Global African Diaspora Initiatives of the AU.
- 6. We support Peace, Security and basic human dignity within Africa and around the globe, with an emphasis on stopping slavery in the AU nations and in the African Diaspora.
- 7. We support the organization of African and peoples of African descent's self-interest and uplift through a committee structure and take responsibility for organizing such in the United States of America.
- 8. We support the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA) of 2000 and seek the creation of a new plan between the United States of America and the African Union that is supportive of the African Diaspora in the USA and would be sustainable not only in Africa but also in the host countries of the African Diaspora. We do this based on usage of sovereign based public private partnerships.
- 9. We support political empowerment of Africans as individual citizens and in free associations on cooperation and solidarity in the continent and in the Diaspora.

10. We support the creation of a company called the African American Diaspora Holding Company & Investment Trust which will create financial solutions through the US Federal Reserve and its banks.

We will be updating these Operating Principles by May 25th 2019.

On December 25th 2018, FAU began to offer global programming in seven focus areas:

- (1) developing intergenerational community wealth;
- (2) business development that erases the digital divide and builds wealth for economically disadvantaged people;
- (3) next-generation civic infrastructure with governance at the neighborhood level;
- (4) comprehensive Internet of Everything based education;
- (5) healthcare system solutions that effectively serve the entire population;
- (6) combating racism through economic development; and,
- (7) human rights development using the UN's Universal Periodic Review process.

Over its existence (2012-2019) FAU has recruited allies (including Native American and African tribal groups), built an affiliate structure with national country bureaus, state assemblies, and local chapters, and lined up resources. FAU and its allies are signatories to some \$90B worth of bank-based Community Benefit Agreements.

FAU as a civil society organization operates under relevant international human rights instruments, in particular the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, will be used to address problems such as the past history of institutionalized racism in the USA through the #2019BlackFolksPlan. We do so bearing in mind that the United States of America, a founding member of the United Nations (UN) and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, practiced from its formation, in its constitution of 1788, human slavery.

Within a 9-month period that started December 25th 2018 FAU will propose by May 25th 2019 a solution to the results of the fundamental injustice, cruelty, brutality, and inhumanity of that human slavery that was legal from 1788 to 1865 (77 years). In 1868 the freed slaves, African nationals and those born in the USA and other person in the USA were given citizenship through the 14th Amendment to the aforementioned US Constitution. Now we rejoin our African Brothers and Sisters in creating solutions which leverage our \$1.2T GDP in the USA.

The #2019BlackFolksPlan is to be a solution to the laws and policy decisions passed by local, state, and the federal government that practice of institutionalized racism on Americans of African Descent from 1868 to 2000 and as important their effects subsequently de jure & de facto of that racial & economic discrimination on the descendant Americans of African heritage. FAU and allies will build a solution called the #2019BlackFolksPlan. It will be built on our answers to the UN's 2015 Universal Periodic Review of the USA and in the case of Zimbabwe based on the 2016 Universal Periodic Review of Zimbabwe. (Listed below is our first meeting with Zimbabwe Government in 2015.)

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Global African Stakeholders Diaspora Convention, Washington DC, 19- 22 November 2015

Under the auspices of the AU ECOSOCC and the support of AU CIDO Secretariat, the Global Africa Diaspora Comention will fake place in Washington, DC / Baltimore, Maryland on November 19-22, 2015. The Convention will facts us of the role of Africa Diaspora in Africa's development on the most vital issues of identifying and applying capacities; sensitizing the shared values of the African Union's Agenda 2063 and the unique role of AU ECOSOCC in engaging the civil society as partners in development; and improving stakeholders' understanding and cooperation on common policies that are applicable to all constituencies, including Diaspora representation at the AU ECOSOCC.

After the Global Africa Diaspora Summit in 2012 and the AU Declaration, the Global Africa Diaspora Convention provides a common forum and unprecedented opportunity for diverse constituencies, including women and youth organizations, in the Diaspora to assess common developments and highlight innovative ways to improve outcomes that rely on system building and harmonized recommendations for evidence-based policies. The expected outcomes are enumerated in the concept and content of the program.

The Global Africa Diaspora Convention will bring heightened focus on the African Union 2015 Theme: Year of Women Empowerment and Development towards Agenda 2063 with innovative programs and support for the CIDO's implementation of the Africa Diaspora Volunteer Corps and other AU Diaspora Legacy Projects. Events in the Margin will include information on opportunities in member state and Diaspora participation in the NEPAD Africa Trade Fair on Indigenous Products and Services in May 2016.

Stakeholders will participate in various Roundtable and Plenary Sessions. Representatives of organizations, policy makers, the media, representatives of Historical Black Colleges and Universities, public and private sector leaders, are expected to attend. The Presiding Officer of the AU ECOSOCC is expected to address the joint assembly of stakeholders.



The Global Africa Diaspora Convention 2015 was focused on the implementation of the African Union Global Summit of 2012 was held in 2015 that identified capacity for engagements. The Convention also sensitized the African Union Agenda 2063 and shared values for an integrated, prosperous and peaceful Africa driven by her people. It was also the historic milestone to welcome the



African Union Economic, Social and Cultural Council to the Diaspora in collaborative efforts to engage stakeholders in opportunities and the development of Africa.

The AU Constitutive Act declares that it shall "invite and encourage the full participation of the African Diaspora as an important part of our continent, in the building of the African Union." The AU defined the African Diaspora as consisting of "people of African origin living outside the continent, irrespective of their citizenship and nationality and who are willing to contribute to the development of the continent and the building of the African Union."

Global Africa Diaspora Convention is to promote and sensitize the core of AU as the hub of African related activities in the international fora. AU is not an oasis; we exist in an increasingly interconnected global society. FAU believes that Africans must write our own scripts, articulate African priorities, and forge mutually enhancing international/ multilateral partnerships, which depart from dependencies and to foster the African Renaissance as per decisions of the AUC. ECOSOCC is the unique AU organ that engages the civil society as partners in these drives.



The African Union's Economic, Social and Cultural Council (ECOSOCC) was established in 2004 as an advisory organ to the AU. Under Article 4 of the African Union ECOSOCC Statutes, ECOSOCC is composed of 150 Civil Society Organization (CSOs): two (2) CSOs from each Member State; ten (10) CSOs operating at regional level and eight (8) at continental level, twenty (20) CSOs from the African Diaspora, as defined by the Executive Council and covering the continents of the world; and six (6) CSOs, in ex-officio capacity, nominated by the AU Commission and based on special considerations, in consultation with Member States. With the third AU ECOSOCC General Assembly starting in December, 2018 we will ask to join as a coalition of of civil society organizations including the newly created (2019) FAU Zimbabwe Bureau.

A HISTORIC OPPORTUNITY FOR AFRICAN AMERICANS TO ALIGN AFRICAN NATIONS WITH THE USA FROM A HEADQUARTERS IN OHIO The African Dollar will be built on a system that is intended be a very broad programming platform where a FAU Chamber of Commerce member acting as a developer can build games, financial applications, gambling apps, insurance products, social networks, and pretty much everything we already use today.

However, as a currency platform it will be gold backed and is to be run off a decentralized system with a shared ledger system based on a fork of Blockchain technology with embedded MDi/GLINC solutions that make the system what we will call ULTRA SECURE.

The FAU Global African American Stimulus Plan will use the African Dollar System so as to provide African Dollar ULTRA SECURE Payment Solutions at a million locations by 2020. We would start in 20 states with the \$62.6 in established Bank Community Benefit Agreements.

Placing faith in the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action. Paragraph 7 of the Durban Programme of Action specifically "requests the Commission on Human Rights to consider establishing a working group or other mechanism of the United Nations to study the problems of racial discrimination faced by people of African descent living in the African Diaspora we would issue the African Dollar as a public private partnership, through FAU Zimbabwe Bureau, as to solutions in the country of Zimbabwe. We do that work based on our previous work in Civil and Human Rights in the United Nations and African Union.
