Low height-for-age is known as stunting.


It is the result of chronic or recurrent undernutrition, usually associated with poor socioeconomic conditions, poor maternal health and nutrition, frequent illness, and/or inappropriate infant and young child feeding and care in early life. Stunting holds children back from reaching their physical and cognitive potential.

Young children are particularly vulnerable to negative effects of malnutrition. Even before the COVID-19 pandemic, poor nutrition was the underlying cause of nearly half of all deaths of children under five.

The first 1,000 days of life—from pregnancy to a child's second birthday—is a window of tremendous physical and cognitive development. Adequate calories and micronutrients (like Vitamin A and Iodine) are crucial to help children grow, learn, and thrive.

For infants, prevention includes supporting breastfeeding and Vitamin A supplements. A capsule of vitamin A given to a young child twice a year can reduce the chance of death by up to 25% and protect their eyesight and health.

The prevalence of stunting (low height for a child's age) and child malnutrition is starkly divided along economic lines. In 2020, 22 percent of the world's children under 5 were stunted, with most of them living in low- and lower-middle-income countries.

Poor nutrition during first 1,000 days of a child's life — starting in pregnancy and ending with their second birthday — has a profound impact, from a child's brain development to their immune system to their growth. Calories alone are not enough.

For pregnant women, it's making sure they receive a special form of prenatal vitamins with essential vitamins and minerals, which increase the chances a baby will be born at a healthy weight and survive to their second birthday.

Supplying a child with two high doses of Vitamin A every year is one of the most cost-effective ways to protect children from blindness, diarrhea, and other fatal illnesses.

Until recently, Vitamin A supplementation was routine and easily accessible because it had been paired with national polio vaccination efforts.

However, now that polio has been mostly eradicated, these vaccination campaigns are being phased out. After years of increasing, the number of children who have access to Vitamin A coverage has started to drop alarmingly.

Transitioning national Vitamin A supplementation efforts to a sustainable delivery platform is essential to ensuring children continue to receive this critical preventive regimen.

Despite the proven benefits of supplying pregnant women with a full dosage of multiple micronutrient supplements (MMS), the majority of women do not have access to these critical supplements. MMS increases the chances a baby will be born at a healthy weight and survive to his or her second birthday.

Babies get the best start at life when they drink nothing but breastmilk until they are 6 months old, and continue breastfeeding until they are 2 years old while also consuming other nutritious complementary foods.

Even though breastfeeding is the best way to protect newborns from malnutrition, infections, and disease, only 41% of babies around the world are exclusively breastfed.

Many mothers who would like to breastfeed cannot access the support and information they need to be successful. One-to-one and group breastfeeding counselling helps provide mothers with the support they need to reach their breastfeeding goals.

The first priority of any nutrition program should be to make wasting (low weight for height) treatment unnecessary by preventing children from ever becoming wasted.

Unfortunately, millions of children every year still require wasting treatment. Ready-to-Use Therapeutic Food (RUTF) is an energy-dense, life-saving product that gives wasted children the nutrients they need to survive.

Yet we are reaching less than a quarter of even the most severely malnourished children.

Expanding coverage of services will help ensure no child dies because they don't have access to the fundamental treatment they need to stay alive.

SO, WHAT'S TO BE DONE?

Ending child malnutrition has long been a core issue for RESULTS. In the face of the growing crisis, we intensified our efforts in 2022 — and it paid off in significant legislation and public funding.

In October, President Biden signed the Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act into law. This major victory could help save millions of lives around the world.

“This law’s passage did not just happen on its own,” said RESULTS Executive Director Dr. Joanne Carter.

“There have been nearly 17,000 pieces of legislation introduced since 2020 and only 1% of them have been directly signed into law.

RESULTS advocates,
including myself,
began pushing for this
legislation in the fall
of 2021, amassing
bipartisan support in
the House and then
the Senate for the bill.

Our nationwide network met with their members of Congress and staff, published letters to the editor about the growing global malnutrition crisis and the promise of the legislation, and kept pushing until the law was passed.

Administrator Samantha Power made a historic announcement that USAID will give \$200 million to the UN Children's Fund (UNICEF) to purchase and distribute ready to use therapeutic food (RUTF).

This bill will ensure U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) nutrition programs are more coordinated, effective, and accountable to our existing global nutrition efforts. This would ensure that we are maximizing U.S. investments and directing nutrition funding

This bill would also require USAID to report to Congress on progress toward clear and defined benchmarks and goals. One of our first tools in the fight against malnutrition is information. We need more data so we can make sure our strategy works. Then we can tailor our approach to reach more children and their families with lifesaving and life-sustaining care.

USAID programs that focus on pregnant people and young children are necessary because regular food assistance or agricultural aid might not meet their unique nutritional needs.

The Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act instructs USAID to scale up the four essential actions (["The Power 4"](#)) that will help prevent children from dying of severe malnutrition. These include supplying all pregnant people with prenatal vitamins, supporting breastfeeding, continuing large-scale vitamin A supplementation, and expanding coverage of specialized foods for treatment of severe malnutrition.

It would accomplish this by authorizing the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) to advance targeted and evidence-based malnutrition programs, coordinate with international and interagency partners, and integrate nutrition priorities into existing global health and agricultural programs.

The Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act would also mandate robust monitoring and oversight of nutrition programs to ensure that U.S. investments are used effectively.





Around 200 million youth ages 12-17 are currently out of secondary school, and 80 percent of children in low-income countries lack access to preschool.

Introduced by Representatives Karen Bass (D-CA) and Chris Smith (R-NJ) and Senators Dick Durbin (D-IL) and Marco Rubio (R-FL), the READ Act Reauthorization Act of 2022 is a reauthorization of the original 2017 READ Act.



It develops a global, comprehensive integrated strategy that improves educational opportunities, and addresses key barriers to children's school attendance, and retention and completion, especially for girls & those with disabilities.

Girls, low-income children, and children with disabilities are affected the most. In low- and middle-income countries, up to 70% of 10-year-olds are unable to read a simple text.

The longer vulnerable children are out of school, the less likely they are to return, and the World Bank estimates that this generation of students will lose \$17 trillion in lifetime earnings.

According to Robert Jenkins, UNICEF Chief of Education:

Dr. Robert Jenkins also said and we agree, “Students need intensive support to recover lost education. Schools must also go beyond places of learning to rebuild children’s mental and physical health, social development and nutrition.”

According to UNICEF “More than 370 million children globally missed out on school meals during school closures, losing what is for some children the only reliable source of food and daily nutrition.”

The READ Act Reauthorization of 2022 is before the US Congress for passage. It has now passed the US House of Representatives, and is awaiting a vote on the US Senate floor.

FRIENDS OF THE AFRICAN UNION is an economic, social, humanitarian, charitable, educational, STEAM and new media civil society organization founded to work for the benefit of the people of the African Union (AU) and the African diaspora in their host countries.

FAU is organized around the action in 2005, when the AU defined the African Diaspora as "... peoples of African descent and heritage living outside the continent, irrespective of their citizenship, and who remain committed to contribute to the development of the continent and the building of the African Union."

Since 2021 Friends of the African Union (FAU) recognizes that the United Nations Permanent Forum on People of African Descent (PfpAD) is the only worldwide intergovernmental organization to unite and service the needs and aspirations of the more than 1.6 billion African people, globally. FAU supports creation of a civil society organization around the PfpAD.

BUREAUS & CHAPTERS INFORMATIONAL SUMMARY

FAU State Assemblies are organized around the national governmentally recognized states and Capital Cities that are not states. Each Shall have its Annual Assembly in which all Chapters in the state shall be entitled to send a naturally born Male and Female members (general & youth) to vote on resolutions of action. At state level FAU Assemblies are joint operations with the proposed Friends of the UN Permanent Forum of People of African Descent through its General Assembly, Civil Society Bureau, Diaspora Bureau and Business Operations Bureau.

FAU Congressional District Cooperatives are geographic subdivisions of a State Chapter based on the congressional districts in that state and or system of government in which they are created.

FAU Regional Chapters are political and geographic subdivision in other than the USA and may be metropolitan statistical area (MSA) in the USA. These are a geographical region with a relatively high population density at its core and close economic ties throughout the area.

FAU Metropolitan Chapters are organized around a city inclusive of its surrounding areas that has more than a 100,000 people like the one in San Diego.

FAU Neighborhood Chapters are within a FAU Metropolitan or City Chapters that has over 1,000 or more members of FAU who live in proximity to each other.

FAU smartWISE Community Reinvestment Coalitions shall be community reinvestment coalition created for each city, metropolitan, county or state FAU chapter and made up of members of the people of the African Union, the African Diaspora & through regional coalitions work with their allies.

FAU College and University Chapters and FAU School Chapters shall be for each institution and made up of members of the people of the African Union, the African Diaspora and their allies.


FAU Affiliated Organization Chapters shall be for each organization which has formally aligned with FAU and made up of members of the people of the African Union and the African Diaspora.

FAU Prison and or Jail Chapters shall be for each institution and made up of members of the people of the African Union and the African Diaspora.

FAU Bureaus are national organizations organized by 2 or more citizens of that country. They are an American trade organization that will create joint ventures incorporated per the laws of that country. Each country shall have an assembly of state chapters and that assembly may have representative groups for Capital Cities that are not states, also Women, Men, Youth, Elders, People with Disabilities, Veterans, Military, Foreign Government Service Employees and the people who are not in the country and of the global African Diaspora.



Coalition building is a mandate from the international on down to local chapters and coalition in which Friends of the African Union engages in building alliances, partnerships, and smartWISE Community Reinvestment Coalitions to better advance our work and agenda. These coalitions are based on mutual respect and common causes. Our allies represent members both part of and outside FAU. It is our objective to continue to build bridges and form alliances to further advance the voice and struggle of people of African Descent all over the country and world. Our solidarity is not limited to borders, barriers, beliefs, or behaviors. We believe all people should live freely and communally and we our partners share the same vision.



THE FIRST GLOBAL AFRICAN DIASPORA SUMMIT

Done at Johannesburg, South Africa 25 May 2012

Leading up to this historic event was relevant African Union Decisions including Decision EX.CL/Dec. 5 (III) on the Development of the Diaspora Initiative adopted by the Third Ordinary Session of the Executive Council in Maputo, Mozambique, in July 2003, Decision EX.CL/Dec. 221 (VII) on the Africa-Diaspora Process adopted by the Eighth Ordinary Session of the Executive Council in January 2006 and Decision EX.CL/Dec. 406 (XII) on the First African Union Diaspora Ministerial Conference adopted by the Twelfth Ordinary Session of the Executive Council in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia, in January 2008 on the modalities for Diaspora participation in the organs and activities of the Union and Decision Ass/AU/Dec.205(XI) adopted by the Eleventh Ordinary Session of the Assembly of the Union in Sharm El-Sheikh, Egypt, in July 2008 on the Africa Diaspora Summit, Decision, Ass/AU/Dec 354 (XVI) of the Sixteen Ordinary Session of the Assembly of the Union in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia in January 2011 on the Roadmap for the Diaspora Summit, including the convening of a Technical Experts meeting in Pretoria, South Africa in February 2011 and Decision Ass/AU/Dec 367 (XVII) of the Seventeenth Ordinary Session of Assembly of the Union on the convening of a second Ministerial Conference on the margins of the United Nations General Assembly in New York in September 2011 as well as Decision Assembly/AU/Dec. 393(XVIII) endorsing the outcome and conclusions of the Second Ministerial Conference held in New York in September 2011. They tasked us as a People of African Descent in the Global African Diaspora with 5 Tasks.

This event recalled the commemoration in 2007 of the bicentennial of the trafficking in Africans with the establishment of the Diaspora African Forum as an obligation to remember the legacy of history, particularly the era of slavery and colonialism and the enforced separation of African people as a result of that experience, as well as the Declaration of the United Nations of 2011 as the year of the of People of African descent.

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The Global Africa Diaspora Convention 2015 was focused on the implementation of the African Union Global Summit of 2012 was held in 2015 that identified capacity for engagements. The Convention also sensitized the African Union Agenda 2063 and shared values for an integrated, prosperous and peaceful Africa driven by her people. It was also the historic milestone to welcome the African Union Economic, Social and Cultural Council to the Diaspora in collaborative efforts to engage stakeholders in opportunities and the development of Africa.





Global African Stakeholders Diaspora Convention, Washington DC, 19- 22 November 2015

Under the auspices of the AU ECOSOCC and the support of AU CIDO Secretariat, the Global Africa Diaspora Convention will take place in Washington, DC / Baltimore, Maryland on November 19-22, 2015. The Convention will focus on the role of Africa Diaspora in Africa's development on the most vital issues of identifying and applying capacities; sensitizing the shared values of the African Union's Agenda 2063 and the unique role of AU ECOSOCC in engaging the civil society as partners in development; and improving stakeholders' understanding and cooperation on common policies that are applicable to all constituencies, including Diaspora representation at the AU ECOSOCC.

After the Global Africa Diaspora Summit in 2012 and the AU Declaration, the Global Africa Diaspora Convention provides a common forum and unprecedented opportunity for diverse constituencies, including women and youth organizations, in the Diaspora to assess common developments and highlight innovative ways to improve outcomes that rely on system building and harmonized recommendations for evidence-based policies. The expected outcomes are enumerated in the concept and content of the program.

The Global Africa Diaspora Convention will bring heightened focus on the African Union 2015 Theme: Year of Women Empowerment and Development towards Agenda 2063 with innovative programs and support for the CIDO's implementation of the Africa Diaspora Volunteer Corps and other AU Diaspora Legacy Projects. Events in the Margin will include information on opportunities in member state and Diaspora participation in the NEPAD Africa Trade Fair on Indigenous Products and Services in May 2016.

Stakeholders will participate in various Roundtable and Plenary Sessions. Representatives of organizations, policy makers, the media, representatives of Historical Black Colleges and Universities, public and private sector leaders, are expected to attend. The Presiding Officer of the AU ECOSOCC is expected to address the joint assembly of stakeholders.




CHAPTERS

1. We are unapologetically Black in our positioning and are aligned with the African Union definition of the global African Diaspora.
2. We are guided by the fact that all Black lives matter, regardless of actual birth gender or perceived sexual identity, gender identity, gender expression, economic status, ability, disability, religious beliefs or disbeliefs, immigration status, or location.
3. To love and desire freedom and justice for ourselves is a prerequisite for wanting the same for others. Our tools include the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the Preamble to the US Constitution and the US Constitution itself as a work in progress.

2020 Reparations Rationale Update - Accounting for inflation through 2019, the #BlackFolksPlan, with an interim update on February 4th, 2020, if we use the \$20,000 that the Japanese received for 3 years in Concentration Camps (1942-1945), then we asked for funding it would be \$1,114,463.18 per person in 2020 dollars if applied to the 4,660,920 Africans in 1866, at the end of the civil war, August 20 1866. Then the total amount is \$5,194,423,160,011.97 or \$5.2T with damages of \$800B. We will ask for \$6T in our proposed public private partnership using the Daniels IDIQ. This will be a 75 year agreement (2021-2095) in three (3) 25 year periods. In each period we will have 5 year funding commitments with the first 2021-2025.


In the USA we agree to work with HBCU's and the Permanent Forum on People of African Descent centered around August 25th of every year to hold a global BLACK FAMILY REUNION.

The 400 Years of African-American History Commission Act of 2018 established the 400 Years of African-American History Commission to develop and carry out activities throughout the United States to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the arrival of Africans in the English colonies at Point Comfort, Virginia, in 1619. **We established on August 25th, 2019 our year of Remembrance and Return**

Picking up from that work around the 400 Years of African American History Commission Act at the 2022 Bretton Woods Global Summit we started a 50 state all territory and DC campaign in all 435 congressional districts of the BIPOCA Alliance of America (ie Black Folk in partnership with Indigenous Folk with People of Color and Allied People in a Alliance) to build solutions to American inequality and inequity based on our first year's action together in building a historical model of America around labor and capital from August 25th, 1619, to August 25th, 2022 that will report its work at the second meeting of the United Nations Permanent Forum of People of African Descent.

In December 2013, the UN General Assembly adopted resolution 68/237, by which it proclaimed 2015 to 2024 to be the International Decade for People of African Descent, with the theme “People of African descent: recognition, justice and development”. The resolution established the following specific objectives for the International Decade:


- ❑ To strengthen national, regional and international action and cooperation in relation to the full enjoyment of economic, social, cultural, civil and political rights by people of African descent and their full and equal participation in all aspects of society;
- ❑ To promote a greater knowledge of and respect for the diverse heritage, culture and contribution of people of African descent to the development of societies;
- ❑ To adopt and strengthen national, regional and international legal frameworks in accordance with the Durban Declaration and Programme of Action and the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, and to ensure their full and effective implementation.

The concept of dividing humankind into three, four or five races (often called Caucasoid, Mongoloid, Negroid, and Australoid) was introduced in the world in the 18th century by Western scholars in the context of "racist ideologies" during the age of western colonialism. 




White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health

September 28th 2022

The first White House Conference on Food, Nutrition and Health in 1969 was a pivotal event that influenced the country's food policy agenda for the next 50 years.

The Biden-Harris Administration has set a goal of ending hunger and increasing healthy eating and physical activity in the U.S. by 2030 so that fewer Americans experience diet-related diseases, such as diabetes, obesity, and hypertension. The Conference will galvanize action by anti-hunger and nutrition advocates; food companies; the health care community; local, state, territorial and Tribal governments; people with lived experiences; and all Americans, and it will launch a national plan outlining how we achieve this goal.

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PILLARS

The nonprofit CDC Foundation is identifying cross-sector partners to make transformative commitments that support one or more of the five Conference pillars.

- ❑ Improve food access and affordability: End hunger by making it easier for everyone — including urban, suburban, rural, and Tribal communities — to access and afford food. For example, expand eligibility for and increase participation in food assistance programs and improve transportation to places where food is available.
- ❑ Integrate nutrition and health: Prioritize the role of nutrition and food security in overall health, including disease prevention and management, and ensure that our health care system addresses the nutrition needs of all people.
- ❑ Empower all consumers to make and have access to healthy choices: Foster environments that enable all people to easily make informed healthy choices, increase access to healthy food, encourage healthy workplace and school policies, and invest in public messaging and education campaigns that are culturally appropriate and resonate with specific communities.
- ❑ Support physical activity for all: Make it easier for people to be more physically active (in part by ensuring that everyone has access to safe places to be active), increase awareness of the benefits of physical activity, and conduct research on and measure physical activity.
- ❑ Enhance nutrition and food security research: Improve nutrition metrics, data collection, and research to inform nutrition and food security policy, particularly on issues of equity, access, and disparities.

This important conference and the commitment to a national strategy on ending hunger and healthier eating will build on the research and knowledge we now have to make America truly a stronger, healthier nation.

With this gathering of elected officials; advocates and activists; and leaders of business, faith, and philanthropy from across America, we are mobilizing the will to meet a bold goal: to end hunger in America and increase healthy eating and physical activity by 2030 so fewer Americans experience diet-related diseases.

This national strategy will serve as the playbook to meet this vital goal. It calls for a whole-of-government and whole-of-America approach to addressing the challenges we face. When families can't afford healthy food options, it's harder for children to succeed in school, and it can lead to mental and physical health challenges for the whole family. For so many families—including families of color, those living in rural communities and territories, and low-income families—structural inequality, such as disparities in educational and economic opportunities and lack of access to health care, safe housing, and transportation, make the impact of hunger and diet-related diseases even more severe. The pandemic made these problems worse, reinforcing the need for urgent, sustained action.

Despite these challenges, we know what to do. This national strategy builds on the historic strides that my Administration has already made to bolster economic security for American families and cut child poverty across the country. And it harnesses our greatest resource—our fellow Americans.

Everyone has an important role to play in addressing these challenges: local, State, territory and Tribal governments; Congress; the private sector; civil society; agricultural workers; philanthropists; academics; and of course, the Federal Government. In developing this national strategy, my Administration has listened to and learned from many remarkable advocates, including people who have experienced hunger and diet-related diseases themselves. To all of you, I am grateful for your unwavering commitment to meet this moment.

Together, we can build a healthier future for all Americans.



Starting with the 2022 White House Conference we will use it to catalyze the public and private sectors around a coordinated strategy to accelerate progress and drive transformative change to end hunger, improve nutrition and physical activity, and close the disparities surrounding them. This is to be the model used by Fiends of the African Union around the nation from a HQ in Orlando Fl with work that started in LA county this past October. We will work with the nonprofit CDC Foundation who is working to identify cross-sector partners interested in making transformative commitments to align their efforts with the Biden-Harris Administration.

The WelHealth Program is a lifestyle and behavioral-change initiative (developed and administered by PhitTech) for veterans that uses integrated health and wellness technology and programming produced, designed, implemented, and administered by PhitTech, LLC (PhitTech) in collaboration with its service partners such as NEON. The Program is designed to effectively improve health outcomes and lower health costs. It provides daily monitoring, observation, validation, and reporting of physiological and wellness activity data (and high-utility social impact).

- Yes, we know that is nearly \$250B but as a National Community Reinvestment Coalition member we plan to use funds and expertise that created over \$354B in Bank agreements since 2016.
- It is a 25-year program.
- It will be done with over 500 domestic partnerships in every state, territories and DC.
- Over 200,000 will be for American Veterans living overseas.
- We start in Ohio, Florida, Pennsylvania, California, Maryland, and New York buy buying existing housing.

We plan to buy properties to house not only American Veterans but add safe and quality housing for the American military.

In addition, in Sierra Leone we will start to serve African Veterans in the same manner.






